

Judging Others

*See Luke 6:37-42

Connotation

What does Jesus mean by "Judge not"?

→ He cannot be prohibiting moral discernment (i.e., judging right and wrong) Mt 7:5 - "take the speck out of your brother's eye" Mt 7:6 - Identifying others as "pigs" or "dogs"

Mt 7:15-20 - Identifying false prophets

1Co 5:1-5 - Casting out the one from the assembly who is sexually immoral

Gal 1:8-9 - Testing whether a message is consistent with that delivered by the apostles of Christ

Phil 1:9-10 - Prays for love abounding with knowledge and discernment. 1Jn 4:1 - "test the spirits to see whether they are

from God" Jesus is prohibiting hypercriticism and

hypocrisy:

- A critical spirit
- A readiness to blame others
- Rash or hasty judgements
- Magnifying the errors of others
- Not having empathy toward others
- Judging others for the same things we do
- Exalting ourselves while looking down on others

We must realize that we are all equal before God

→ Romans 14:10-13; James 4:11-12; 2Sam 12:1-12

Why do we want to judge others?

→ To make us feel better about ourselves!

Jesus continues to instruct His disciples on how to live as subjects in the Kingdom of Heaven

This might be the most wellknown verse by non-Christians

¹"Judge not, that you be not judged.

(2) God will judge us the same way we judge others: Mk 4:24; Mt 5:7; 6:12, 14-15

²For with the **judgment you pronounce** you will **be judged**, and with the measure you use it will be Why are we not the Judge? measured to you.

(3) We should know our own sins better than anyone else's (Rom 2:1)

³Why do you see the *speck that is in your* brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye?

> (4) It's hypocritical to focus on other's sins more than our own

⁴Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye?

> (5a) We can't help others until we've first addressed our own sin

⁵You **hypocrite**, first take the **log out of your own** eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye.

> (5b) Jesus calls us to help others rather than judge them Matthew 18:15-20; Gal 6:1-5

⁶"Do not give **dogs** what is holy, and do not throw your pearls before pigs, lest they trample them underfoot and turn to attack you.

Credentials

Why should we not judge others?

→ If we are in danger of being judged, then it means that we are not the judge!

- We are NOT qualified
- We don't know other's heart or motive
- There is only one Lawgiver and Judge (James 4:11-12)
- A servant can only be judged by their master (Romans 14:4)
- We are guilty of the same things (or worse) we identify in others (2 Sam 12:1-12; Rom 2:1)
- → See the speck / log illustration in vv. 3-5
- → Jesus is using an absurd contrast to make His point

Hypercriticism: excessively and unreasonably critical, especially of small faults.

Hypocrisy: pretending to be what one is not or to believe what one does not.

| Contingency | What about those who refuse to be helped?

o "Dogs" should \mathtt{NOT} be thought of as household pets: in scripture they are normally wild, associated with what is unclean, despised

See 1 Sam 17:43; 24:14; 1 Kings 14:11; 21:19; 2 Kings 8:13; Job 30:1; Prov 26:11; Eccl 9:4; Isa 66:3; Matt 15:27; Philippians 3:2; Rev 22:15

 \rightarrow Pigs (Lev 11:7) and Dogs (Lev 11:27) serve together as a picture of what is vicious, unclean, and abominable (2 Peter 2:22).

We CANNOT force the Gospel on others

→ God has given us the ability to choose, and many will choose to ignore His plan. We cannot choose for them.

| Consider 7:13-14 (two paths/gates) & 7:24-27 (two foundations)

Do not engage those who treat the Gospel with contempt

→ Prov 9:8; 23:9; Matthew 10:14
